A Message From the Principal

As I write this, light snow is falling on this very relaxing snow day. It is also one week before the official beginning of spring when we hope to get back to that wonderful winter/spring weather we had a few weeks ago! It has been a very interesting winter indeed.

The end of the 3rd marking period is fast approaching – March 31st. It is hard to believe how quickly this year is passing. One of the fun insights about the passing of the year, is just how many activities and celebrations we have taken part in or will soon be participating. Heritage is a very busy place, as I have mentioned in my weekly Alert Now's. RBA has had another successful season. Another initiative Heritage has embraced this year is our Love and Logic philosophy to approaching relationship building and problem resolution. The book we reference is "Teaching with Love and Logic" but there is also a parenting version, "Parenting with Love and Logic" by Faye

and Funk. Our Heritage staff have tapped the surface of the wealth of tips and strategies that help us understand appropriate behavior and understand how to move forward when we don't see it. The most important principles focus on short, one line interventions, not attempting to have discussions when the student is upset, and listening and showing empathy. When we allow students time to calm down, when we give them a genuine listening ear, and when we share with them that we understand - then we can move forward. Many of the pieces of knowledge we have acquired have been truly eye opening – and most important – they work and preserve the dignity of the child; no embarrassment, no humiliation - and if consequences are needed they fit and they are fair. I am really pleased that we have adopted

the Love and Logic mindset and we will plan on continuing with it and growing deeper in understanding and applying L & L to our daily interactions.

As we enter the 4th and final quarter of the year, I encourage all of you to encourage your child(ren) to remain focused and committed to giving their best. This upcoming quarter will offer many fun events as the end of the year comes about, but there is also much more to focus on in our learning! Reading Madness Begins! Let's Read!

Reading Madness is back at Heritage! This district-wide reading incentive program started on Wednesday, March 1st and runs through May 1st.

Students are being encouraged to track the number of pages they read (this includes when you and your child read together at home, books your child reads on their own, or books read to your child at home). All students who participate will earn a special reading incentive party with awards going to the top three readers in the school (Barnes and Noble gift

cards)! The class that reads the most pages will also earn a popsicle party in May.

Attached to this newsletter is a reading log where you can track the number of pages your child reads. If you need extra reading logs please ask your child's homeroom teacher or Mrs. O'Neill. Completed reading logs can be turned in to your child's classroom teacher or Mrs. O'Neill. There is no limit to the number of reading logs they may submit!

We also have exciting news about myON. Many of you may remember my-ON as an online resource for eBooks for children—it has primarily been used as a resource over the summer, but the district recently purchased a license so it can be used year round! I reviewed how to access myON with all the students at the beginning of March so they can now use it at school and at home. And, books read on myON count for Reading Madness!

To access myON students will need to log in to Clever. From home you can go to clever.com and have the students log in using their Red Clay Google accounts, or go to the Heritage Web site and click on Resources and

then Clever. Their Google login should be s.firstname.lastname@r edclayschools.com. Password is their lunch number. If you have any questions about logging on, please feel free to email me. Happy reading!

Inside the Art Room: Share the LOVE

Heritage students have been busy in the Art room! They recently completed a school-wide "share the love" project. Students were inspired by artist Robert Indiana's LOVE sculptures to create their own art work with the iconic LOVE typography. The unit connected to the children's book "Ordinary Mary's Extraordinary Deed," which explores the snow-ball effect acts of kindness can have. Many of the art works were given as gifts in order to spread love and kindness.

Fifth grade students

are exploring fiber art as they sculpt their own clay loom and weave yarn in the center of their designs. Fourth and third grade students are finishing up color study paintings of pets inspired by artist George Rodrique and his Blue Dog paintings. Second and first grade students are inspired by the theme of home as they learn about art work created by Mexican American artist Carmen Garza and African American artist Faith Ringgold. They are working to create their own

paper and clay houses. Last, but not least, Kindergarten students are exploring the art of Japan as we welcome spring with cherry blossoms. Ask your child what they are learning about in Art today!

The Reading Corner: Reading Tips for Parents

Reading Tip for Parents: What's "Just Right"?

Children feel confident and competent when they read books that are "just right." But how do you find a "just right" book? Have your child read the back and front cover, and first page of the book. If there are more than five words that he cannot pronounce or understand in context, the book may be too challenging. Be supportive about finding a more perfect fit. Choosing the right book will help your little reader feel successful.

Reading Tip for Parents:

Map it Out It's important to provide your child with a variety of fiction and non-fiction reading. A fun way to do this is to get a map and show them the way from your house to the grocery store or another familiar destination. Have

your child write out the directions, street by street, and then read them to you as you walk or drive to the store – like a living GPS!

Reading Tip for Parents:
Card Tricks Do you think effective reading only takes place at libraries and book stores? Think again!
There are reading opportunities everywhere. Go to a greeting card store with your child and read the greeting cards together.
Later, vote for the ones whose words convey the best birthday wish or getwell sentiment.

• Reading Tip for Parents:
Picture This! During
your next outing or gathering, take action-packed
photos, then have your
child create captions to go
with each picture. Assemble the pictures and captions in a picture book or
album, and add speech

and thought bubbles to create a personalized – and probably hysterical -graphic novel.

Reading Tip for Parents: Last Comic Stand-

ing Take time to read comic strips together. Share favorites from your own childhood and have your child put his favorites on the fridge. Read them aloud, and often -- repetition is a great way to build reading skills. Soon, he'll love looking forward to the "Sunday funnies" each week.

Reading Tip for Parents:
Become a Fan Your
child will soon develop a
love for particular authors
and illustrators. Nurture
her fan-ship by helping her
write a letter to her favorite author. Many authors
have their own websites
with contact information,
but here's a great place to

start your search (http://www.scholastic.com/kids/stacks/authors/all.htm). You can also contact the book's publisher, the mailing address for which can often be found on the back of the title page or on the publisher's Web site.

Labels of Love Word
recognition and vocabulary are important parts of
reading. On a rainy day,
get some paper and tape
and start labeling everything in your home -from furniture to small
knick-knacks. Reading
these labels repeatedly
will build your child's
mental word bank. If your
family is bilingual, create
labels in both languages.

Fourth Grade News

Fourth grade is taking adventures by land, air and water through our reading series. In our unit 5 stories we adopt the adventurous spirits of our characters as they are the first to make discoveries or accomplishments. We will continue to develop and reinforce our comprehension skills and strategies while reading these stories. We encourage you to have your child read for at least 20 minutes each night. Then, ask your child to summarize or retell the text with a beginning, middle, and end. Remind your child to record their pages for Reading Madness. Reading Madness logs are due May 1st and can be submitted to homeroom

In math, students are learning the metric system. Students are developing an understanding of measurement with length, capacity, mass and time. Students can strengthen their skills by logging onto Dreambox or Khan Academy for extra prac-

tice

We are excited about our upcoming trip to the Delaware Symphony Orchestra. Because of the snow day on 3/13 it was cancelled but parents will be notified once the new date has been confirmed. New permission slips will go home and must be signed and re-

turned. Chaperones are needed. Please contact your child's teacher if you are interested in attending.

Over the past four weeks, students have used music to support their understanding of fractions, while they also developed the basic concepts of rhythm and time. In small groups, students worked collaboratively to create and compose a compose a class composition. Now students have a better understanding of fractions in relation to parts of a whole.

Brett Humphrey is Heritage Elementary's Geography Bee Winner


The following students competed in the final round of the Geography Bee: fourth graders
